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STEAMBOAT SPRINGS RIDE

* I've reserved three RV campsites and the two remaining cabin cottages at the Steamboat Springs Campground. The three campsites reserved have already been spoken for but I believe that a few more • are available if you act quickly. The campground is nearly full already! The RV campsites are \$34 per night and include water and electricity. The cabins have a bathroom in them as well as a small kitchenette and a TV. The fee is \$79 per night and they have 2 double beds in them. You must bring your 🔹 own linens. If you are interested in staying in the cabin, let me know. The campground sounds nice – it 🔹 has a heated pool, hot tub and access to the hot springs. They are located right on the Yampa River. Bus service is free and will take us from the campground into town on a regular basis.

♣ If you are not into camping, please feel free to 'camp out' in a Steamboat hotel of your choice. We would still ride up together and meet for rides, etc on Saturday afternoon. The Rodeo is Saturday evening and there is a big bar-b-q before hand that would be our dinner. By the way, the rodeo is held right • there in town. So you can either walk to it from the nearby hotels or hop on the free bus system.

As the time gets closer, I'll need to get a final count of people going so that I can get the tickets for the ◆ rodeo. But for now, could you let me know if you're planning to join us and if you'll be staying in the campground or in town.

• Rodeo tickets are \$13 for presale or \$14 on the day of. I'd like to use the presale and have them ahead of time. Seating at the rodeo is general. The gates open at 5:30 and the BBQ starts about then. Cost for the BBQ runs anywhere from \$4.50 for a hot dog to \$14.95 for a big ol' rib dinner. Soft drinks, water, • beer and wine will also be available for \$2.50 to \$4.25.

Enough philosophizing. Love you all and hope to be riding with you soon, and often.



APRIL GAME NIGHT




Game night is scheduled for April 28 at the home of Ray and Nancy Daniels. Pot luck starts at 6:30 with Battle of the Sexes to follow.

There are too many upgrades and accessories to list here and there are lots of items installed on the bike that you cannot see, such as headlight modulator, 4x4 firefly brakelight flasher (both on the bike and on the trailer), Progressive springs (front forks, fork brace, and Progressive magnumatic shocks on the rear), startron trailer wiring harness and lots of other items. Lots of items that are not stock items. Bike has just over 75,000 miles as well as the trailer. Trailer has new tires. Shocks have been rebuilt on trailer, brushes have been changed out on alternator, always garaged, never been involved in an accident, perfect condition, tires are in excellent condition. There is also a brand new 12 disk CD player installed in the trunk.

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Survival secrets from Experienced Riders from Minnesota Motorcycle Safety Center

- Don't forget to carry your motorcycle insurance card on your bike or in your wallet
- Be careful on railroad crossings that have the black rubber-style mats, as these can be very slippery, especially when wet
- Headlight angle is greatly affected when carrying a passenger. Have a spot on your garage door or wall, where the headlight normally shines with you sitting and when it's adjusted properly. (If you need to, make a mark of some sort in order to check your headlight aim periodically.) Now you can easily check and adjust your headlight if you carry a passenger.
- When riding with other motorcyclists with whom you haven't ridden with before, leave more distance between the bikes until you understand the differences in riding styles and comfort levels.
- When parking on blacktop, one way to prevent your sidestand from sinking in is to put it on a painted strip. The paint reflects the sun's heat and will be a firmer base for your stand.
- Buy a good quality tire gauge, and get in the habit of checking your tires before each day's riding. Proper tire pressure provides better traction, longer tire life, and better mileage. Plus, you can visually catch tire problems before they get out of hand.
- A rainy day riding is still better than a good day at work!
- Women riders: if you wear an underwire bra, in the event of an accident, the underwire may come out of the fabric and puncture the chest. In addition to piercing injuries, this may also result in a collapsed lung.
- Be cautious using engine braking when in traffic. Because your brake light does not come on when you engine brake, vehicles following you will be unable to determine your intentions. Always use your brakes when slowing down.

- If you don't have a fuel gauge or a low-fuel light, be sure to reset your trip meter every time you get gas and know the distance limits of your bike so you don't find yourself running out of gas.
- Get the best helmet you can afford.
- Tape some dollar coins in a safe place in case of emergency (good old duct tape). The coins are not affected by water so they don't need any special packaging.
- Pretend you're invisible. Assume everyone out on the road is trying to make you crash. That way, any surprises from other road users will be pleasant surprises.
- Wave to little kids. Not only does this increase your conspicuity, little kids think motorcycles are really cool. You'll totally make their day, and maybe improve their parents' image of motorcyclists in the process.
- If you can't see around something like a building or a fence, assume there's a left-turning vehicle there, and respond accordingly. To truly be in control, you have to take responsibility for everyone else's actions as well as your own.
- Go out of your way to avoid rent-a-trucks. (Remember the last time you moved?) You know that whoever's driving that truck is having one of the worst days of his life, and his mind is everywhere but on the road.

It's time to get out on the road again. So, get your cameras and you notepads. I need pictures and articles for the newsletter. Share places you have been, including restaurants, scenic roadways, museums, towns, etc.

Remember—this is **your** newsletter. I count on all of you to help me make this a winning newsletter for our chapter.
