Past Member comes to the Springs

About June 28, 2012, a few employees from Cheyenne Mountain Air Force Station gather at "The Hatch Cover" to celebrate the retirement of an Army Colonel. I was ready to go when this man called out "Is your name Earl?" At first I didn't recognized the man. "Who wants to know?" I said. "Didn't we take a trip to South Carolina several years ago?" It was Don Dudley. Imagine that. Don was in our Chapter I in the early 1990's. Anyway, he came up to visit his son that owns a limo service.

Well, the story goes...back in 1996, give or take a year or so, Wing Ding was in Greenville, SC. I was going, but was going to travel alone, because everybody else was leaving earlier in the week. Back then, I did much camping and took along MRE's (Meals Ready to Eat) that I saved from Army maneuvers. We changed out of our rain gear and it was game on. Don was pulling a home-made trailer with a 1988 Honda Gold Wing. I had a 1989 Wing. The plan was to stop around Oklahoma City for the night, but we were not tired, so we kept driving. Don was a big gambler when it came to fuel...little did I know. Don't be DEAD RIGHT!
