After the new F6B came out, I received a few emails and phones calls about the new motorcycle. People wondering if I'm going to buy one or what do I think of the motorcycle. Well, at the time I didn't know much about the motorcycle or have not seen it in person or ridden it. So I did a little research.

As I walk across the parking lot on numerous occasion, I have noticed many nice vehicles in the parking lot, i.e Cadillac's Escalade, Toyota's Camrys & XLS, Lincoln's Town-cars, Lexus' ES & RX, Ford's Eddie Bauer Editions, also pick-up trucks with all the trimmings and loaded with extras. The vehicles have all of the bell and whistles i.e. heated steering wheels & seats, power windows, mirrors, seats & locks, ONSTAR, HomeLink, CD player, XM and Sirius radio, and on and on. I'm not angry with anyone that has all of these items...in fact WE all DESERVE them and worked hard to get them. We should and shall be comfortable with them. Now we have some of the same features on a Gold Wing, heated handlebars and seats. adjustable shocks, XM or Sirius radio, central locking, self-canceling turn signal, CD player w/ radio, & ABS brakes just to name a few items.

CPR CLASS

Hello All. The next CPR class will be on March 9, 2013 at the Air Force Academy @ 8 am. Keep in mind that you should be enrolled in the Riding program for the class to be free. The District is paying for the class if enrolled in the program. If you CPR card is about to expired or has expired, take the class to keep current.

"Level III of the REP is also referred to as Certified Tour Rider/Co-Rider. It represents the commitment of the Rider and/or Co-Rider to be prepared in the event of an accident to give aid and possibly save lives. This is done by being knowledgeable in First Aid or CPR and carrying a first aid kit on their motorcycle at all times.

It would be wonderful if we could achieve the coveted goal of zero accidents, however, we know realistically, accidents will happen. Because of this, it is important to be fully prepared to lend aid to unfortunate accident victims. It is important to always be prepared to save a life. Level III of the Rider Education Program was developed to deal with such circumstances by recognizing and encouraging proper First Aid or CPR training. CPR (Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation), has been used to save many lives. Being trained to render CPR or First Aid is a tremendous asset to those the REP participant will come in contact with daily.

Requirement: Current in Level II and have taken either First Aid or CPR training

No cost to sign up. Patches available at \$4.00 per participant

Receive: "Certified Tour Rider" or "Certified Co-Rider" patch". (taken from GWRRA web site)

There are only 12 slots available for this class.

As the winter wore on, they added more thresh until, when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entrance-way. **Hence: a thresh hold.**

(Getting quite an education, aren't you?)

In those old days, they cooked in the kitchen with a big kettle that always hung over the fire.

Every day they lit the fire and added things to the pot. They are mostly vegetables and did not get much meat. They would eat the stew for dinner, leaving leftovers In the pot to get cold overnight and then start over the next day.

Sometimes stew had food in it that had been there for quite a while.

Hence the rhyme:

"Peas porridge hot, peas porridge cold, peas porridge in the pot nine days old."

Sometimes they could obtain pork, which made them feel quite special.

When visitors came over, they would hang up their bacon to show off.

It was a sign of wealth that a man could, "bring home the bacon."

They would cut off a little to share with guests and would all sit around and chew the fat.

Those with money had plates made of pewter.
